## About the Unitarian Universalist Women's Connection...

This organization began 43 years ago when Unitarian and Universalist women's groups merged. Though not a legal affiliate, the district group has been inspired by the Continental UUWF since its inception. When Continental announced its revisioning process in 2005, a task force was charged by the district membership to do the same. The UU Women's Connection was incorporated non-profit this year with new bylaws, council governance, new name and vision to carry into the 21st century. Though this process is ongoing, the UU Women's Connection is committed to continuing the work begun through our sisters of the CMwD-UUWF.

The organization's new name, "UU Women's Connection", represents its intended mission to connect Unitarian Universalist women within the district, to stimulate interest in aspects of the Unitarian Universalist movement and concerns of the world, and to serve as liaison between women of the district and the larger UU movement.

#### Financial Assistance...

Our membership has always felt it is important to provide opportunities for grants or scholarships. We offer various options for reduced fees to make attendance accessible:

- childcare grant to relieve some of the costs of childcare encountered by mothers who attend our retreats, a reduced registration fee of up to \$20 is available to those who request it.
- ministerial student grant our membership recognizes the importance of supporting our ministers in training. We offer one ministerial grant of \$100 on a first-apply-first-receive basis for ministerial students from the district.
- need-based grant limited funds are available to reduce the financial burden for women who could not otherwise attend due to monetary hardship.
- first-time attendees grant to encourage new members to participate in the retreat, the first five women to register, who have not previously attended, will receive a waiver of their registration fees.

#### The Spirit of Women (film)

This remarkable documentary tells the story of an event that revolutionized the women's movement. For four days in November of 1977, at the first federally funded National Women's Conference in Houston, Texas, activists caucused, argued, and finally hammered out a Plan of Action. Archival footage breathes life into heated debates over issues like the Equal Rights Amendment, reproductive freedom, sexual orientation, and minority rights. The women on the front lines included First Lady Rosalynn Carter, former First Ladies Betty Ford and Lady Bird Johnson, and activists Coretta Scott King, Bella Abzug, and Barbara Jordan. Current interviews with Gloria Steinem, Ellie Smeal, Ann Richards, Carmen Delgadow Votaw, Liz Carpenter, and Betty Friedan bring a deeper understanding to the legacy of Sisters of '77 the Conference.

# 1. Guided Imagery: a safe way to experience the presence of your Spirit Marge Harmon

This workshop will facilitate a relaxation technique through deep breathing exercises as well as guided imagery, moving you to an awareness of your mind, body, and Spirit.

### 2. The Giver, Book Discussion Betty Jachim

What novel has received high critical acclaim, continues as a young adult classic, but is substantial enough to generate earnest discussion among adult readers at book retreats offered through the Minnesota Women's Press? It's a short, yet powerful and provocative book about a perfect world of no war, fear or pain. Jonas is chosen to receive special training from The Giver, setting up the theme of balancing the values of freedom against security. Lois Lowry's The Giver is readily available in libraries and bookstores. Come join us and, maybe later, your youngsters in a surprisingly deep discussion.

#### 3. Spirit of Change: Project Dirty Laundry Sara Carpenter

Through social justice projects women of spirit are seen making positive changes to their communities. Sara will share her experiences with Project Dirty Laundry and discuss how to air the dirty laundry in your community and world, as well as how to work together to clean it up.

### 4. Spíritual Drumming Rebecca Gearhart

Rebecca will introduce the cross-cultural use of sacred drumming by highlighting Native American and African spirituality. We will listen to samples of drum rhythms, learn about their ritual contexts, and duplicate the rhythms. Participants are invited to bring their own drums, but there will be extras to share.
