Diana DeWeese, who spent some quality time at General Assembly this year in Charlotte, NC shopping for new curricula and other resources for the Connection's growing resource library expanded the list of offerings. So if you are looking for a woman- centered program here are some of the gems she found at GA this summer:

The Goddess Diaries – a CD created by Carol Lee Campbell, the Diaries as an experiment after years of working as a women's advocate in the DC area. Inspired to produce a show about real women's lives she asked women in her community to write down their stores and then tied them together through a common thread: the agricultural seasons of the year. Borrowed from the ancient Western European calendar of equinoxes, solstices and cross-quarter days, each monologue represents a specific time in the growing/harvest season and each season becomes a metaphor for life events.

The Water Ritual by Carolyn McDade and Lucile Longview – the script for the original workshop service *Coming Home, Like Rivers to the Sea: A Woman's Ritual* – distributed at the 1997 General Assembly of the UUA in Phoenix, Arizona.

Return to Wholeness, The New Book of Crone Stones by Carol Lee Campbell. Accompanying the book is a set of crone stones created by the author.

Rise Up and Call Her Name a donation from Councilor, Juli Cicarelli, of the sourcebook for – a woman-honoring journey into Global Earth-based Spiritualities written and edited by Elizabeth Fisher. Juli also donated **The Queen of Myself** by Donna Henes

As mentioned in the Summer VOW, the Connection Resource Library also includes:

Unraveling the Gender Knot – Challenging the Systems that Binds Us – by Barbara Schonborn, Alison Campbell, and Rosemary Matson – a Study Guide for the book - The Gender Knot – Unraveling our Patriarchal Legacy by Allan G. Johnson, which can be purchased through the UUA Bookstore online. The course examines ways the patriarchal system in which we live affects girls and women, boys and men.

Becoming Women of Wisdom – Marking the Passages into the Crone Years – a curriculum in thirteen circles – by Melody Lee with Karen Edwards and Dorothy May Emerson. The curriculum is designed to prepare women to take on the important role of Wise Women in their communities.

Cakes for the Queen of Heaven Part 1 - In Ancient Times, and Part 2 - On The Threshold -- Rev. Shirley Ranck's popular women-centered religious education curriculum for adults and older youth. Revised in 2007.

Also worth mentioning from the resource library are two films:

Sisters of '77 – the film. Twenty thousand people from across the U.S. gathered in Houston, Texas on an historic weekend in November 1977 for the first federally funded National Women's Conference, aiming to end discrimination against women and promote equal rights. Notables were former first ladies Betty Ford and Lady Bird Johnson, Rosalyn Carter, and women of all ages, ethnicities, and political backgrounds. Combining footage of the conference and interviews with influential women's leaders such as Barbara Jordan, Bella Abzug, Betty Friedan, Gloria Steinem, Eleanor Smeal, Ann Richards, and Coretta Scott King, Sisters of '777 is a fascinating look at that pivotal weekend in 1977.

Iron Jawed Angels – Award winning film directed by Katja von Garnier, tells the inspiring true story behind the women's rights movement in America. Hilary Swank stars as Alice Paul, a fiery female who is determined to see the day when women are granted the right to vote. Paul's determination eventually helped to change the tide of history forever. Co-starring Angelica Huston, (as Carrie Chapman Catt) Frances O'Connor, Julia Ormond, and Molly Parker, the film is an engaging tribute to an oft-forgotten moment in American history.
