A Farewell Note

UU only a short while, a stranger to the CMwD, it was frightening to be asked to lead the district's first and only independent UU women's organization--the UU Women's Federation. That was just after 9/11. There was a lot to be afraid of Winter 2011-Spring 2012

then, or so it seemed. Still, I tend be attracted to things that frighten me. Even though I didn't know many in the district and couldn't conceive of how to lead without a full slate of officers and board members, I said, "yes." It was an "edge time." Star Hawk explained in her workshop a couple of years ago, "edges, where one ecosystem meets another are dynamic, full of possibilities, chaos, and creativity." How could I resist?

By January 2005 "The UU Women's Connection" emerged as UUWF's successor. Only seven years ago, the Connection had its first official meeting at the home of Mary Lou Steadman in Bloomington, Illinois. Now a brand new nonprofit, independent of, but working within the Central Midwest District of the UUA, we were officially launched.

Thank you to so many women from all parts of the district whom I came to know over the years. They helped make the Connection possible. A stab at naming the names of those women is attempted on the Connections website blog, *Pushing the Edge*. The list is far too long to do so here.

For now though, heartfelt thanks to councilors and officers past and present; to our loyal units, individual members and to the many women who have planned and carried out so many wonderful UUWF or Connection retreat programs. Thank you to those who have assisted with special programs like 2010's women's leadership recognition and 2008's Fifty Year Allerton Reunion. Thank you to those who used our grants and other support over the years to make a difference in our world.

Thank you to all the hundreds of women who shared their voices and ideas at more Margaret Fuller Conversation Salons than I can number. Many times Connection programs emerged from these conversations. Thank you to our various church hosts who fed us and put us up and gave us space for our quarterly business meetings.

Finally, thanks and love to the person who made my twelve years with the UUWF and the UU Women's

Connection possible: my husband, Randy Pratt. He kept the home fires burning on my many trips out of town (at least six or seven times per year) and supported my volunteering with treasure and time, encouraged me when things were difficult and celebrated when things went well. He helped with many Connection cyber and computer projects like the e-list, the member databases and countless VOWs. He "put up" the Connection website www.uuwomensconnection.org and wrote "code" for my design ideas there. Now thanks to him, I can post content, photos, newsletters, or even put up a new page.

The 2011 fall retreat on Lake Michigan this past year provided a metaphor for the future of our organization in my mind; it is one for my own life after the Connection, as well. Though it was the 29th annual fall retreat since the women at Rockford began on Williams Bay, the spot in Kenosha on Lake Michigan was familiar and brand new at the same time. We are at home on the water for this fall retreat, intrigued by the new shore on the ocean-like vastness of Lake Michigan. The unseen shore on the other side calls us to the broader world. During the retreat, we walked to the beach to bless the waters of the world.

An unusual and unexpected storm the week before had deposited sand on the grassy areas near the beach. We were among the first to investigate the shore with bits of colored glass, shells, sea weed, pieces of drift wood with barnacle hitchhikers-pretty little treasures the storm had blown ashore. We joined water birds investigating the small tide pools teaming with life. Our footprints mingled with bird prints in the sand on the storm swept beach. Looking for a port there, were we also what the storm blew in?

At the 2011 Central Midwest District's Annual Assembly the president of the board announced changes in store for the region and the Association. The GA continued the discussion in North Carolina and a recent announcement sealed the deal. Instead of our present "district" organization, we have begun the task of combining CMwD with Heartland to the east and Prairie Star to the west forming a larger regional entity.

Much like Lake Michigan when we stood there on the beach this past fall, a larger world has opened to us. A larger world of programming, participation and potential awaits us in this new arrangement. We are on the "dynamic edge" again as we see new challenges that bring us face to face with a possible future and beckon us to carry on.

I am so lucky have been along for this amazing ride: UUWF board to task force to interim council to first council to the continuing work. I am filled with gratitude, only a very small sorrow at leaving and so grateful for the memories.

The Goddess Diaries – a CD created by Carol Lee Campbell. She created the Diaries as an experiment after years of working as a women's advocate in the DC area. Inspired to produce a show about real women's lives she asked women in her community, many of them members of her congregation, to write down their stores and then she tied them together through a common thread: the agricultural seasons of the year. Borrowed from the ancient Western European calendar of equinoxes, solstices and cross-quarter days, each monologue represent a specific time in the growing/harvest season and each season becomes a metaphor for these life events.

The Water Ritual by Carolyn McDade and Lucile Longview – the script for the original workshop service *Coming Home, Like Rivers to the Sea: A Woman's Ritual* – distributed at the 1997 General Assembly of the UUA in Phoenix, Arizona.

Return to Wholeness, The New Book of Crone Stones by Carol Lee Campbell. Accompanying the book is a set of crone stones created by the author.

Sourcebook for *Rise Up and Call Her Name* – a woman-honoring journey into Global Earth-based Spiritualities written and edited by Elizabeth Fisher. Juli also donated *The Queen of Myself* by Donna Henes

Unraveling the Gender Knot – Challenging the Systems that Binds Us – by Barbara Schonborn, Alison Campbell, and Rosemary Matson – a Study Guide for the book - *The Gender Knot* – *Unraveling our Patriarchal Legacy* by Allan G. Johnson which can purchased through the UUA Bookstore online. The course examines ways the patriarchal system we live in affects girls and women, boys and men.

Moving On!

We started the year with a Strategic Planning session and First Quarterly meeting at Williams Bay. Due to the business model of Aurora University, the council decided that continuing to hold our fall conference at Lake Geneva was not financially feasible. A few years ago, we were able to offer low-cost dormitory beds, but those rooms were now being used by students. The campus administration also required an attendance count 30 days before the conference. Most women send in their registrations after that 30-day deadline – some even the week of the conference. The council decided to move the fall conference to downtown Kenosha, Wisconsin. The conference keynote and workshops were held at a harborside hotel, at a storefront yoga center (thank you Heather Poyner!), and at the Bradford Community UU Church in Kenosha. Visiting UU Congregations in CMwD

2011 was an ambitious year for UU Women's Connection. We traveled to Missouri, Wisconsin, the Chicago area and Springfield, Illinois for our quarterly meetings.

Many thanks to Melinda Farhangi and the men and women of the UU Church of Columbia, Missouri for hosting our Second Quarterly Meeting. The programming the Connection offered to the women of the congregation included a "slice" from Cakes II – Mary Magdalene.

In August, our Third Quarterly Meeting was held in the Chicago area, hosted by the Countryside UU Church in Palatine, with help from the Northshore Unitarian Church in Deerfield. We went as a group to the Art Institute for a "Goddesses and Women of Power" tour. Simply Amazing! Who knew how images of the feminine divine we would find! On Sunday I dressed up as a Babushka and read the book Thundercakes to the children in the RE program at Countryside.

In October, at the end of the fall conference, council women attended Sunday services at the Bradford Community UU

Church in Kenosha, WI and the Olympia Brown UU Church in Racine, WI. Both services were memorably. Personally, I learned so much more about the traditions of Halloween – like the origins of the word "bonfire" and Jack O'Lantern – than I ever knew.

Thank you Juli Cicarelli for your generous donation to the lending library!

To increase visibility of the Connection we sponsored a booth at the District Assembly in April, and shared a booth with other women's organizations at General Assembly in June.

The scholarship donations collected from members and friends of the Connections will now be recognized as donations to the "Emily Meter Scholarship fund" in honor of long time member Emily Meter who passed away in 2010.
